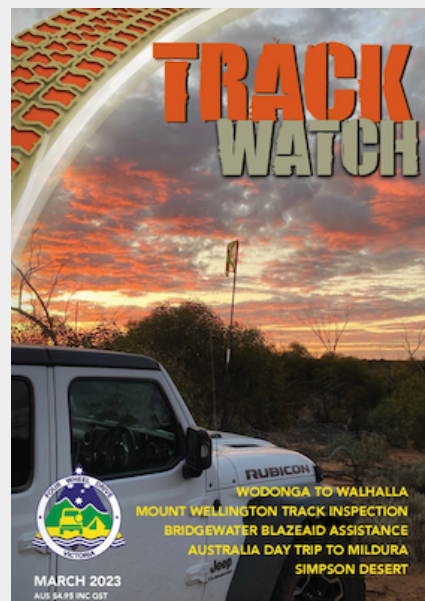
This month's meeting

Attracting New Members

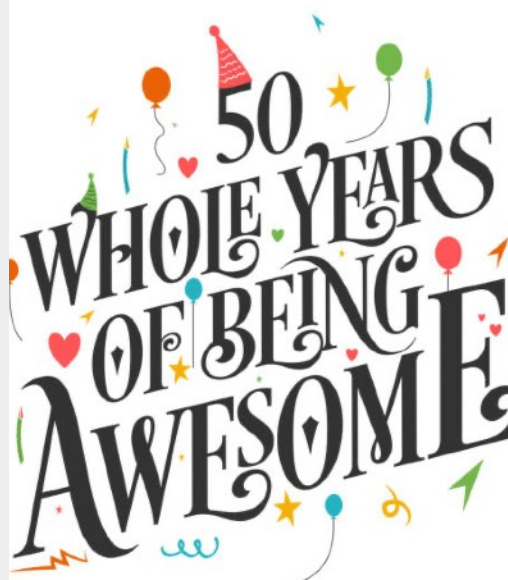

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Track Classifications

Four Wheel Drive Victoria have a track grading classification scale which has been developed to assist in advising Trip Leaders and participants on 4WD trips of the type of tracks that they can expect to encounter. On most trips participants can expect that a variety of tracks will be traversed each with an appropriate rating. Trip Leaders should advise participants of the range of track ratings expected to be encountered on the planned route. The following classifications will assist in determining an overall Trip Rating:

Trip Report

Driver Training 24-26th March by Andrea



The 4wd training trip was a thrilling experience that lasted for two nights. Friday - Melbourne to Blue Gum Camp in the Big Desert

We had a big day of driving to get from home into camp so an early start for everyone meeting at BP Calder Park outbound for an 8:30am departure. Once we had filled up the vehicles and ourselves we got on the road. Jacqui was leaving a bit later and was going to catch up with us further up the road. I had found some silo art that I had not seen before so as is usual for us we travelled roads that we had not before and headed to St Arnaud to look at the Silo Art that was there and it was a fabulous black and white composition. They also had a lot of art around the town but we did not account for that in the trip planning so will have to head back there another time to check it out.





Next stop was the famous Birchip Bakery for one of the best vanilla slices ever. Once we got into town we took a bit to find the bakery but soon enough we were filled up with vanilla slice and yummy food sitting in the middle of the street watching the world go by and meeting the Birchip Mallee Bull



Jacqui was keeping us updated on her travel as well but she was still not within easy distance so we kept traveling north and called into the silo art at Lascelles as some of our traveling party had not seen it before.





We then followed this site up with a view of the silo at Patchewollock and the big Mallee Fowl sculptures. Driving from Patchewollock through to Underbool we saw petrol pumps in Walpeup and thought it was good to know they are there. I had already called ahead to a garage in Underbool to check they would be open so we could top up with fuel before we headed into the desert.

Once we were filled up with fuel we were into our final stages of getting into the beautiful blue gum campsite. We just had 5km of sand dunes to traverse but as is typical with any track you hit after 4pm the fun was just about to begin. We had our camper trailer on and the sand was dry and deep so we had to have a couple of goes to get up and with the use of our trusty max tracks we got up. Everyone had to take a bit of a run up to get up to the top and Daisy had a good go with her camper trailer but ended up needing some help to get up so Tristan drove her car up a bit like he stole it but got it up to the top.

We got into camp and chose our spot which we got the pick of as there was no one there yet. We then headed out to our meeting point with Jacqui that we had organised earlier. We met Jacqui and got her aired down to head down the firebreak track into camp. I spoke to Stu and Maree as they had ended up in Rainbow for the weekend so we arranged to meet them the following morning for our trip through the desert to Rainbow where we were planning to meet Callum and have lunch. We collected wood and had a great night around the fire.



Saturday - Milmed Rock track to meet Callum in Rainbow for lunch and then back through Chinamens Well Track to camp - Plan, reality something quite different!

We woke to a beautiful day and got on the road to start our trip down to Rainbow around 9am. No sooner had we left camp that I got a message from Callum saying that they had left Melbourne as planned at 7am, not much longer after that I got a second message to say he won't be making it. We found out later that his transmission had blown which was a real shame that he could not come. I then chatted to Stu and Maree to organise our meeting point at the start of Milmed Rock Track. We drove down through Firebreak track through the Murray-Nhill Road and went to the day visitor area at Big Billy Bore to see the bore from the early 1900's. We then went across to the camping area at Big Billy Bore and it was decided that our camp site was the better pick even without facilities.



We then proceeded down Murry-Nhill Road to the start of Milmed Rock Track to meet Stu and Maree. We waited for them to come and I realised that I had not planned it that well as I was not 100% sure on arrival. We waited awhile and then decided to proceed down the track. I said as we left that we will get a call from them and in less than 10mins the first radio call came through.

We carried on as it was in and out of coverage with the ups and downs of the dunes in the desert. They eventually got within good range and caught us up and took over Tail End Charlie responsibilities. Our first stop on Milmed Rock Track was the famous Milmed Rock, the Uluru of Big Desert. We pulled up to a rock that took us ages to climb.

There was a guest book that people had left all sorts of things in if they were needed.

Hills Track is very narrow and there was a fair bit of shuffling to getting past the oncoming traffic. Arrived at the top of Mt Stirling, little bit of a breeze and cool enough to need a jacket now. We walked to the two Peaks for some awesome views & the great photo opportunity.

We proceeded on down the track still with a plan of getting to Rainbow for a slightly late lunch but the track is deceptive with some fun dunes to cross so it was slow going. We came across a road detour sign and road closed sign that was pushed to the side. We thought it was due to a huge bog that had dried out so we carried on our way. We were still on target for lunch... that is until we came across a road closed sign due to an event.. 2 km from the end of the track. I was like WTF, I checked everything and now we have this. We soon worked out why the track was closed, it was due to the Rainbow Enduro buggy racing so everyone walked down to the track to



have a look at all the buggy's zipping past while I was on the phone to Parks Vic to work out a route out. We had a number of vehicles that were getting light on fuel and a trip back out the 68km very sandy track was not ideal. Parks had no idea that the road was closed.

We had lunch while trying to work out a plan. Tristan had spotted another track that was an option for us to get out. Maree found a sign that had Forest Fire Management number on it so I called him and asked how we get out of the park. He was like how did we get to where we were... and I was like we just went down Milmed Rock track for 68km and no sign at the start of the track and no decent detour signs in place. He confirmed the route Tristan had spotted and we went out through a management vehicle track.

I had found another silo art which we were close to so off to Lake Albacutya to see this art that was only finished last year.



We finally got into Rainbow at close to 4pm so a little late for lunch!!

We filled up with fuel and then left Stu and Maree in Rainbow as that is where they were camping... along with lots of people from the Enduro racing. We headed through the Nhill to do another fuel top up and to grab some food for a snack. Then it was back up Murrayville-Nhill Road with some sunset four wheel driving and a little night drive back to camp. A nice short day of driving 🚗



Sunday - Explore the top end of Big Desert and conquer Big Dune

We awoke to another great day with the plan of having a good look around all the tracks at the top end of Big Desert. We headed off towards Border track for the start of the morning and then came across another group of about 6 vehicles. They let us past and we carried on our way, we Saw a couple of other campsites, met some horses on our travels that were being ridden into the area to meet the rest of the family for a picnic.

We then came up to our first challenge of the day. Thompsons Lookout. A nice twisty sand climb that took Tristan and I a few goes to get up. I jumped out and took a spot on the hill and called everyone through one at a time after Tristan had a final go to get up and there was sand flying everywhere! As it was Jacqui's first time doing this kind of driving I jumped in with her to coach her up the hill and the theme of the day was "GO GO GO GO" "Dont Slow Down" "Turn Turn Turn" With a couple of tries we were soon up the top and what a beautiful view!



Michael had a battery issue while we were getting everyone up the hill but Daisy sorted it out with her jump start kit. We then carried along the ridge line up to another great lookout that had a decent climb to get up. We got everyone up with no issues.

Carrying along the track we found Cactus bore, a bore for watering the stock that used to pass through the area.



We started to make our way toward the afternoon fun “Big Dune” through some amazing plains.

We stopped for lunch at the start of Big Dune track with lots of discussion on what Big Dune was going to deliver us. We had all watched the videos but still not sure on what it was like. We finished lunch and headed down the track. We said each vehicle had 3 goes up the dune as we were likely to get others waiting to try it as well





As we went round a corner the Dune suddenly was towering above us at the end of the track. Michael thought we were insane in even looking to try it. We just waited till we got closer to find out more! We found a couple of cars at the bottom of the track. One had got up but the other did not.

The right hand track was the chosen one and we went to the left at the top.

Tristan had a go from the bottom of the track but it soon became apparent we were going to need a longer run up so we backed further up the track to get a good run into the dune. It was about 300m long into a hard left hand turn then 100m into an easy right turn up the dune. Tristan got to the top the second time with some help of Max tracks to get over the last few metres.

Next up was Lynton and his Dune Buggy Jeep that sounded more like V8 than straight 6 and he just flew over the sand. Dennis and his red jeep sprayed a lot of sand and weaved some great trails to get up. Steve in the mighty Pajero got up as well. Air was being dropped out of tyres down to lows of 10-12psi. Michael had been tossing up with not going but then decided to have a go and got up without any issues.



Jacqui and Daisy were a bit unsure but Jacqui put into practice what she learned from the morning session and after a couple of run ups found the speed and tyre pressure combination to get up to the top. So now it was just Daisy and I at the bottom and she decided that she would give it a go and I was like, well I am not walking up the dune so I am going to catch a lift.

The first go we only got about 1/3rd the way up the hill so we reversed back up to have another crack at it. With a bit of yelling from me "GO GO GO" "Turn Turn" Don't Slow down we got further up but still did not make it. So back we went again and this time we dropped more air out of the tyres and I said to Daisy third time is a charm! In between a couple of other vehicles had a go while we were dropping air but they did not make it the first go. So on the next try Well did we move, she was foot flat and with more rubber on the sand we literally took off and flew around the first corner, we hit a bump and got some air time before we turned for the dune and SUCCESS we made it to the top. We all CONQUERED BIG DUNE!!



Now we were all up the top we carried on up another good climb and then a steep descent along a great track back around to the base of the Dune.

It was getting late again so we headed straight back to camp for a relaxing evening talking about conquering Big Dune

Monday - Blue Gum camp to home

We had a big trip back to Melbourne so we were up and ready to head off by 9am after a yummy cooked brekkie. Lynton was running pretty low on fuel and I was like we have fuel in Ouyen so should be ok. Well his fuel light came on and we had about 75km to run. It was going to be touch and go. We thought we would have a fuel stop in Waleup as we had seen fuel bowzers on our way through. We called in to find that they were closed. Lynton had not stopped driving and we waved him through as we pulled out. Next fuel Ouyen, it was a tense time getting back to Ouyen but we made it! When heading out to remote areas it always pays to know fuel stops and utilisation and plan for fuel stations to not be open. I even phone them in remote towns to check opening hours before heading away.

Once we fueled up Michael headed off as we were going to be stopping at some silos and he needed to get back to Melbourne.



Great art as usual. We then headed to Wycheproof Bakery for lunch and debrief before making our way back to reality into Melbourne.

A great trip away with people learning new skills, and having fun in the Desert. One thing is for sure there is way more to explore out there and we will definitely be running more trips out there to explore it all!
